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## HMS, ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS RANKED AMONG 'BEST'



U.S. News & World Report recently published its first-ever rankings of public elementary and middle schools, and all three of our Highland elementary schools and our middle school earned a "Best School" badge.

Highland Middle School was ranked #69 out of 1,224 middle schools in the state. Schools are ranked on their performance on state-required tests, graduation, and how well they prepare their students for high school. Eighty-six percent of students scored at or above the proficient level for math, and 90% scored at or above that level for reading. This ranking places HMS among the top 30% in Ohio.

Our elementary schools were ranked against 1,637 K-5 schools statewide. Hinckley Elementary stands at #30 due to their performance on state-required tests and how well they prepare their students for high school. At Hinckley, 98% of students

scored at or above the proficient level for math, and 92% scored at or above that level for reading.

Granger Elementary has been ranked at #67, with 95% of students scoring at or above the proficient level for math, and 91% scoring at or above that level for reading. Rounding out the rankings is Sharon Elementary School at #148. Ninety-one percent of students scored at or above the proficient level for math, and 92% scored at or above that level for reading.

"These are impressive statewide rankings and we should be proud of the continued growth of our students, despite these challenging times," stated Superintendent Catherine Aukerman. "Our administration and staff at each of these buildings remain committed to the highest academic expectations for our students so that they have every opportunity to reach their full learning potential. I commend them on a job well done."


- Braden Gryskiewicz captured 1st place and received a prize of \$750. He is the son of Mark and Lisa Gryskiewicz of Sharon Township.

Every year some 1,000 National Merit Program participants, who are outstanding but not Finalists, are awarded Special Scholarships provided by corporations and business organizations. To be considered for a Special Scholarship, students must meet the sponsor's criteria and the entry requirements of the National Merit Scholarship Program. They also must submit an entry form to the sponsor organization. These scholarships may either be renewable for four years of undergraduate study or one-time awards.

A member of the National Honor Society, Joey also serves as a DARE Role Model and Peer Leader at HHS. He is the son of Frank and Denise Grecenuk of Montville Township and plans to attend college to study business upon his graduation from Highland.

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## DEPUTY CENTNER RETIRES AFTER SERVING 17 YEARS AS DARE OFFICER

After serving 17 years as the DARE Officer for The Highland Schools, Medina County Sheriff Deputy Sharon Centner announced her retirement in December and was honored for 25 years of service by the sheriff's office.

From a district perspective, Officer Centner has had an impact on literally thousands of students and families during her time in the Highland Schools. Although she's "officially" retired, she will continue teaching DARE classes part-time through the end of the 2021-22 school year.

Officer Centner's investment in students began when they entered preschool or kindergarten -- meeting many for the first time when they participated in the annual Safety Town program -- and maintained a relationship with them through graduation -- and oftentimes beyond.

Deputy Centner has worked tirelessly with the community to provide an excellent education centered on the DARE concepts, which focus on healthy and positive lifestyle choices. Over the years, she also initiated and coordinated many after-school programs such as DARE Skate Night, DARE Bowling Night, and DARE Graduation Night, where 5th grade classes from Granger, Hinckley and Sharon elementary schools assemble for the first time. Each of these activities are always well attended and eagerly anticipated by students and parents alike.

She succeeded in planning lessons that appealed to all ages, engaging students in active learning and participation. Additionally, she utilized middle school and high school students as DARE Role Models to provide a vertical connection between peers, which proved both powerful and effective on a number of levels. She truly wanted to see each student reach his or her full potential.

## KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION OPENS FEBRUARY 8

If you have a child who will begin kindergarten for the 2022-23 school year, **registration opens through FinalForms beginning on February 8.** Highland's kindergarten program consists of an all-day, everyday model. To register, a child must be 5 years old by September 30, 2022. The following items are needed and must be uploaded to FinalForms when registering:

- Parent identification with a picture I.D.
- Proof of residency
- Child's original birth certificate or passport
- Child's complete immunization records
- Certified custody papers (if applicable)



## 3 NAMED 'COACH OF THE YEAR'

Congratulations to Highland coaches Rick Holland (Girls Varsity Soccer), Mary Becker (Girls Varsity Golf) and Lisa Reynolds (Girls Varsity Tennis) who have been named Medina Gazette "COACH OF THE YEAR!" Becker was also named "Coach of the Year" by Cleveland.com.

A former semipro for Reading Town FC in England as a defensive midfielder, Holland began coaching the Highland junior varsity boys' team in 2011-12 and took over the girl's program in 2020, when the Hornets won their first Suburban League American Conference title. A head coach at Cleveland Force Fairlawn from 2010-17, he was the international boys coach from 2017-19 and is currently the head coach at the Heart and Sole Futsal Academy where he has been since 2010. He is also the director and owner of Dynamic Soccer and Fitness in Copley. Holland is a computer science teacher at Highland High School and Highland Middle School.

Becker began the girls' golf program at Highland in 2007 and has served as its head coach ever since. Throughout her time at Highland, she has grown the golf program, coached a number of talented golfers, and guided the team to several Suburban League Conference titles and State Tournament appearances and finishes. Reynolds became head coach of Highland's girls' and boys' tennis programs in 2003. Under her guidance, the Hornets won the Suburban League Championship in girls' tennis in 2012 and have nabbed the SL American Conference the last six seasons. Reynolds owns a 218-117 record in 19 years as coach of the girl's team and 188-91 mark in 17 years with the boy's program, for an overall record of 406-208. She is a 1986 graduate of Highland High School and is currently a language arts teacher at Highland Middle School.

### ABOUT THE BOOK

For his 2020 book, Selingo was embedded in three different admissions offices (a selective private university, a leading liberal arts college, and a flagship public campus) and closely observed gatekeepers as they made often agonizing and sometimes life-changing decisions. He also followed select students and their parents and traveled around the country meeting with high school counselors, marketers, behind-the-scenes consultants, and college rankers. While many have long believed that admissions are merit-based, rewarding the best students, *Who Gets In and Why* presents a more complicated truth, showing that "who gets in" is frequently more about the college's agenda than the applicant. In a world where thousands of equally qualified students vie for a fixed number of spots at institutions, admissions officers often make split-second decisions based on a variety of factors—like diversity, money, and, ultimately, whether a student will enroll if accepted. His book also guides prospective students on how to honestly assess their strengths and match with the schools that will best serve their interests.

Selingo has written about higher education for more than two decades and is a New York Times bestselling author of three books. A regular contributor to *The Atlantic*, Jeff is a special advisor for innovation and professor of practice at Arizona State University. He also writes a bi-weekly newsletter on all things higher ed called *Next*, and co-hosts the podcast, *FutureU*. He lives in Washington, D.C., with his family.

## INAUGURAL SCHOLARSHIP HONORING WILLIAM KUBINSKI

The William L. Kubinski Student-Athlete Scholarship will be awarded for the first time this year, to a college-bound Highland senior who has excelled in the classroom and on the field of play and also plans to pursue a career in education. The scholarship honors Bill, educator and coach, whose career spanned nearly four decades starting in 1964 as an elementary teacher in Brunswick, which led to roles as principal, director of athletics, and physical education. He helped create the Pioneer Conference. Along the way, Bill took on numerous coaching assignments from junior high to high school, leading teams in football, basketball, and track & field. Sports played a large part in his life and role as an educator. It was his belief that sports provided invaluable life lessons -- win, lose, pick yourself up, work hard and strive for greatness.

Bill was selfless, devoted, and perhaps the nicest person one could meet. He made time to talk, teach and coach anyone who wanted to listen, learn and improve. He truly believed in people and their potential. For him, it was "the people who make the difference." To further his life's work, the Kubinski family honors his commitment to education and athletics through this named \$2,000 scholarship to be awarded annually to a student-athlete of Highland High School.

Applications are due by March 18 and will be reviewed by The Highland Foundation Scholarship Committee, along with representatives of the Kubinski family. The recipient will be recognized at the annual HHS Senior Awards Assembly.
